### Overview of the Legal Studies Minor Requirements:

1. At least 24 total credits, including:
  - a. Core Courses: at least 8 credits
  - b. LAW/CRES Electives: at least 8 credits
  - c. Campus Partner Electives: at least 8 credits (*see reverse side*)
  - d. Upper-Division: at least 12 of the 24 total credits must be upper-division (300/400 level)
2. All LAW/CRES courses and Campus Partner Electives must be passed with a letter grade of C- or better
